THE PARISHES OF BRANDESTON AND KETTLEBURGH

Dear Friends,

This month we have been asked to write something about the role of lay elders in the benefice and perhaps encourage some of you to come and join us.

Lay elders are peculiar to the diocese of St Edmundsbury, but we are not peculiar people! In many parishes across the country lay people take non-communion services, help with the chalice and do other tasks in the church. In some places, churchwardens do similar tasks. We stress that we are not “holier” than other people, just that we feel called to help the church’s work at a local level. At first we were concerned that people might think we were becoming rather self-important but everyone has been very supportive. There are two main branches to the Lay Elders’ work: helping with services (liturgical work) and pastoral work. Most of us were trained by the Diocesan team over a period of six months and this training was extremely useful and gave us confidence to try taking/helping with services such as family service and evening prayer and the do’s and don’ts of home visiting and pastoral care. Most of us feel more at home with one aspect rather than both.

Our main task is to allow the clergy to carry out their work with a little less pressure on their time and energies. Also, during an interregnum we are called upon to make ourselves useful! The work is very rewarding both personally and in testing and extending our own faith.

We are not allowed to preach, but we are allowed to give a talk or introduce holy play or read a commentary from a reputable source. It sounds a fine line to tread, but it boils down to not telling people what they should believe or think (we would not presume!), but opening up some lines of possible thought or action.

Among other things we do is, of course, a ministry of prayer. This is personal to all of us in our prayer life, but we also lead intercessions in our churches.

Assisting with Communion by taking the chalice is both a pleasure and a solemn honour. When there are a large number of communicants, it becomes a practical necessity but even when the number of communicants is small it brings something of sharing to the act of communion.

If you have been thinking about how you could help the church’s work, you might like to think about trying out the training in one or both aspects of the work. You would, we feel sure, find it very rewarding.

ALPHA COURSE - CONFIRMED DATES FOR THE COURSE

'Exploring the meaning of Life'

The course will start with a glass of wine and nibbles after the 6.30 Evening Worship at Hacheston on **19th September**. Leonard Payne, the regional representative for **ALPHA**, will preach and give an introduction to the course and its content. If you are interested in coming on the course, or you would like to hear more about ALPHA, please come and listen to him.

The Course will take place on Thursday evenings, in Hacheston Village Hall, where there is excellent parking. We have had to adjust the dates of the course. The **first session** will now be on **23rd September**. VILLAGE VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

Village volunteers are needed to spread the word in their local community about a fundraising campaign to build a new children’s hospice in Ipswich.

Villagers are needed from the width and breadth of Suffolk and North Essex and people living in towns could also take up the position. From Barrow to Yaxley, from Aldham to Wyverstone and all the towns and villages inbetween, EACH hopes the Treehouse Appeal message will reach every Suffolk resident.

East Anglia’s Children’s Hospices (EACH) are running the Treehouse Appeal to raise £3 million to build and equip a new children’s hospice to provide care and support to life-threatened children and their families across Suffolk and North Essex.

EACH are looking for new volunteers to actively promote the Treehouse Appeal by organising collecting boxes and fundraising events as well as spreading the word in their local communities.

There are more than 500 towns and villages across Suffolk and EACH would like to get as many of those places involved with the Treehouse Appeal. As the new hospice will care for life-threatened children and their families in North Essex too, EACH hopes residents from the region will also get involved.

Mark Fox, EACH fundraiser, said: "Someone volunteered for EACH recently and I asked them how they found it, they replied through a beaming smile, 'It felt great, it just gives you that charity high, why don't more people do it?'"

"Volunteers are so important to the charity by distributing collecting tins, picking up cheques, putting up posters in their local community. It really does get us into the little nooks and crannies of the county that can sometimes be really difficult to get to.

"It's easy to become a volunteer, all you need is the passion to make a difference, and what a perfect opportunity to make a huge difference to children with life-threatening conditions and complex health care needs."

SECURITY WARNING

Police are again urging residents to be careful when dealing with doorstep and telephone callers after receiving reports that a company was contacting householders offering property marking 'in conjunction with police'.

The company appears to have been calling residents and claiming to work with police to offer the service to mark valuable items such as TVs, jewellery and audio devices. Any unsolicited calls should always be treated with caution but these appear to be a hoax, as police do not endorse private companies to carry out work like this. If you would like to have your property marked you can have this done free of charge and without further obligation – just contact either your local Safer Neighbourhood Team or local Crime Reduction Officer, or if you are a member of Neighbourhood Watch your local liaison officer, at Suffolk Police on 01473 613500.

Police are also encouraging residents to alert more vulnerable friends, relatives and neighbours to the need to be cautious when dealing with any doorstep or telephone callers.

TIMES PAST

'September blow soft

Till the fruits are in the loft'

Looking at customs and celebrations this month they centre on Harvest Home and Michaelmas. In the past the Harvest Home Supper which celebrated the carrying home of the last harvest load or the cutting of the last upstanding corn, often took place at the end of August or early September.

Harvest Festival services of thanksgiving also were held when the churches were decorated with displays of the finest produce and flowers. Both these celebrations are continued in our two parishes.

September 14th saw Holy-Cross which was the festival of the Exaltation of the Cross. A popular custom on this day was to go nutting. Another custom connected with food was the belief that it was unlucky to eat blackberries after September 29th, Michaelmas.

'On Michaelmas day the Devil puts his feet on blackberries'

St Michael is one of the three archangels, St Gabriel and St Raphael being the others, mentioned in the Bible. Michaelmas is a quarter day in England and was the date for the termination of the year of service for men and women hired at the 'hiring fairs' held the previous year. Anyone who wished to make a change of master did so at this time.

Often rent audits were held too and a celebratory meal was served. Popular fare for Michaelmas dinner was hot roast goose; this being the time of year when geese are in their prime.
