I am also licensed to the parish in North London where Jenny and I live – so I am long distance and part time as well! But I am very grateful for your friendship and support.

NATIVITY at EASTON CHURCH



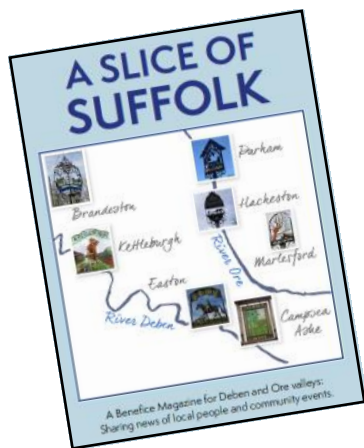
Start the Christmas celebrations with our Nativity at 10.00 am on Christmas Eve!

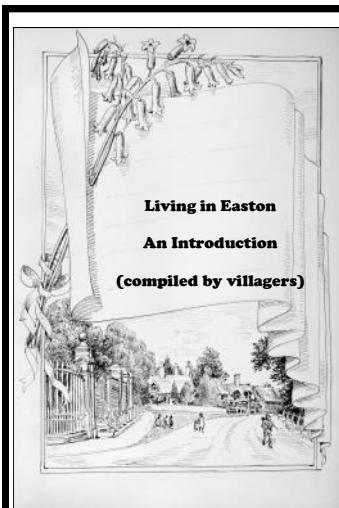
New to the Village?

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH



With Christmas fast approaching some advice from the National Cyber Security Centre and Suffolk Police:-

Online Shopping

Choose carefully where you shop online

It's worth doing some research on online retailers to check they're legitimate. Read feedback from people or organisations that you trust, such as consumer websites. Reputable organisations will have information on their website about how they handle your personal data (which should only be used to fulfil your order, and not shared with third parties).

Some of the emails or texts you receive about amazing offers may contain links to fake websites. If you're unsure, don't use the link, and either:

- type a website address that you trust directly into the address bar
- search for it, and follow the search results

Use a credit card for online payments

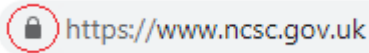
Use a credit card when shopping online, if you have one. Most major credit card providers protect online purchases, and are obliged to refund you in certain circumstances. Using a **credit** card (rather than a **debit** card) also means that if your payment details are stolen, your main bank account won't be directly affected.

Debit card payments and purchases are **not** covered by section 75 of the Consumer Credit Act. But you might be able to make a claim for a refund under a voluntary scheme called 'chargeback'.

You should also consider using an online payment platform, such as PayPal, Apple Pay or Google Pay. Using these platforms to authorise your payments means the retailer doesn't even see your payment details. They also provide their own dispute resolution should anything go wrong. However, they may not provide the same protection as a card provider, so check their terms and conditions before your sign up.



When it's time to pay for your items, check there's a 'closed padlock' icon in the browser's address bar. It will look like this:



The padlock icon doesn't guarantee that the retailer itself is legitimate/reputable (and that their website is secure). It means that the *connection* is secure.

If the padlock icon is **not** there, or the browser says **not secure**, then **don't** use the site. Don't enter any personal or payment details, or create an account.

Only provide enough details to complete your purchase

You should only fill in the **mandatory** details on a website when making a purchase. These are usually marked with an asterisk (*), and will typically include your delivery address and payment details. You shouldn't have to provide security details (such as your mother's maiden name, or the name of your first pet) to complete your purchase.

If possible, **don't** create an account for the online store when making your payment. You can usually complete your purchase without having to create an account by:

- using an online payment platform (such as PayPal) or
- signing in using an existing account with a service provider (such as Apple or Google).

If you think you'll become a regular customer with the store, then you may want to create an account with them.

The store may also ask you if they can save your payment details for a quicker check-out next time you shop with them. Unless you're going to use the site regularly, **don't** allow this. Finally, don't pay by direct bank transfer.

Preventing personal and online theft

Personal Security

- Carry wallets in an inside pocket where possible, but never in your back pocket.
- Zip up hand and shoulder bags, and carry with the fasteners against your body to prevent a thief from dipping into it. Cross body bags which are always in front of you all the time are ideal. —————>

- Keep straps short and bags tucked under your arm, or in front of you.
- Never leave your bags or other valuables unattended.
- Ensure any bags placed on the floor are in front of you so that any movement of the bag will be noticeable.
- Where possible, use a credit card when shopping online as most companies offer protection for your purchases.
- Don't send confidential personal or financial information via email.
- Make sure your anti-virus software is up to date on all electronic devices.

Home security advice

- Avoid publicising Christmas gifts or travel plans on social media.
- Consider fitting burglar alarms to deter a thief from targeting your home.
- Use timer switches to turn on lights and radios to give the impression that someone is home.
- Never leave spare keys in a hiding place outside, such as under the doormat or flowerpot.
- Ensure that valuables can't be seen from the window.
- Make sure that no tools have been left out that could be used to break in to your property.

Picking up on the last point, you may have read in the East Anglian Daily Times of two attempted break-ins in Ipswich. The first by attempting to force open a kitchen window using a pair of shears left out by the occupier; the second using a garden spade to force open some patio doors. Keeping garden tools locked away seems sensible advice.

Whilst I am pleased that we are now moving forward with our new Prime Minister, during these recent weeks and months it has been more important than ever for me to focus on the issues which matter to us locally here in Suffolk. That's why I was delighted to recently welcome to Parliament a delegation of farmers and food producers from Fram Farmers.

Following a tour of Parliament, I was pleased to host a meeting with Fram Farmers where I heard first-hand about the challenges facing Suffolk's farmers and food producers. I have always believed in the importance of UK farmers having a fair and level playing field with farmers from other countries, especially in areas like animal welfare standards, food labelling and quality of grain entering the food chain. In all of these areas, our own farmers are world class.

Whilst I regularly visit farms and food producers across Central Suffolk and North Ipswich, it was great to also be able to welcome some of them to Parliament. It is vital that our Government policies are fit for purpose and it's important to hear the impact that any changes will have on the ground for our local food producers.

I will always do my very best to support Suffolk's farmers and food producers and I will continue to speak with Ministers to make sure that their voices are heard in Parliament.



The effects of the ongoing Avian Influenza outbreak in Suffolk are of significant concern and this is why I have been pressing Government Ministers to better support this important sector. It is essential that the Government continue to consider the impact that these issues have on our farmers, food producers, retailers and ultimately the consumer.

Agriculture, food and drink remain central to our local economy with more than one in seven jobs in Suffolk having some link to food production. We really are incredibly lucky to have such wonderful farmers and food producers on our doorstep and in the run up to Christmas, like you, I will be supporting them by buying local produce and gifts.

Letheringham Notes



The Mardle drew the greatest attendance of the year and raised £425 on the night, with £100 being donated to the Bawdsey Radar Trust.

Remembering your Faithful Friend this Christmas

Christmas may be a time to remember family and friends - but Dogs Trust Snetterton is also asking local dog owners to remember their four-legged friends this festive time, with a *Canine Care Card*.

The *Canine Care Card* is a free service, which helps to ensure your dog's future, in the event of you either passing away, receiving a life-changing diagnosis or moving into a care home. This can often be a great concern to some people, who perhaps do not have a family member or friend in a position to look after their dog, should the worst happen. Therefore, by signing up to the service, Dogs Trust can offer peace of mind, reassuring you that your faithful friend will be well cared for by the charity.

It is easy to sign up to the service, which simply asks for some information on your dog, including their likes and dislikes, as well as your dog's medical history and your vet details. It also asks for you to confirm who you would like as your Dog Guardian. This should be someone you trust, like a friend, family member, solicitor, neighbour or vet, who can sign over ownership of your dog to Dogs Trust on your behalf, should you become seriously ill or pass away.

You can register online by going to www.dogstrust.org.uk and searching for 'Canine Care Card' - or if you do not have access to the internet, you can request a paper version of the application form. Once the form is submitted, Dogs Trust will then write to you, to confirm when your application has been processed.

Once signed up, should your card ever need to be activated, Dogs Trust will then arrange with your Dog Guardian for your dog to come into the rehoming centre or into foster care. With a team of vets, trainers and behaviourists on hand if needed, your dog will then be welcomed, loved and well cared for by the charity, who will work tirelessly to find a loving new home for your much-loved canine companion.

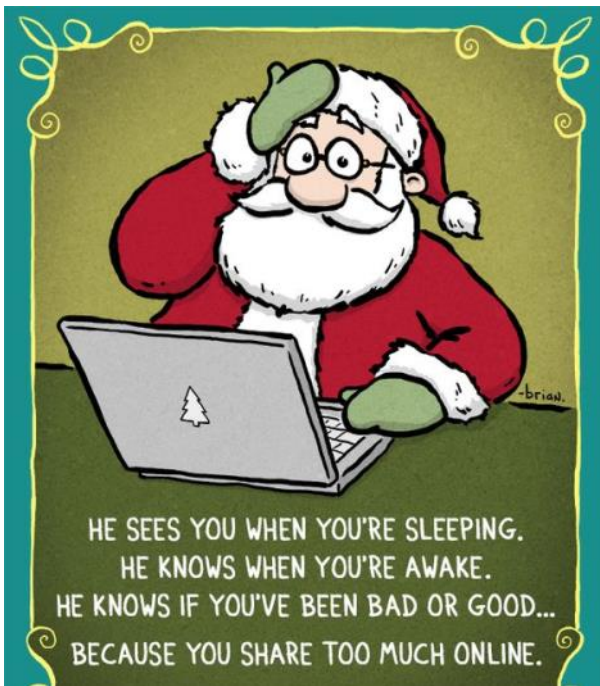
